

Hampden Way reconstruction newsletter



The reconstruction of Hampden Way is now complete. We would like to thank all residents for their patience and cooperation throughout the project and hope you are satisfied with the completed works.



At £3 million, the reconstruction of Hampden Way is the biggest investment in a single road by Barnet Council. We are delighted that the project has been completed to budget and the road reopened on time following its reconstruction. This could not have been done without the help of all residents and businesses within the area. During the project we:



- Reconstructed Hampden Way, from Hampden Square to Summit Way.
- Installed new road safety measures following a public consultation.
- Relayed 4,283m² of road.
- Installed a new drainage system to better manage surface water.
- Removed 3,240 tonnes of material (enough to fill 2 Olympic sized swimming pools), with 80% sent away for recycling.

Over 20,600 hours worked onsite, with zero accidents

Working with the community

Throughout the project, TKJV have worked with the local community, including residents, businesses, Hampden Way Nursery, Oak Hill School and Middlesex University.

TKJV helped local businesses by issuing them with signage that advised they were open whilst the road was being reconstructed. They also assisted in ensuring all local businesses were still able to both receive and make deliveries throughout the project.

The onsite team helped Hampden Way Nursery by removing an old shed, and preparing the ground to make more room for their play garden.





Students from Oak Hill School and Middlesex University visited the project, enabling them to learn about the construction process and ask questions. Barnet Council Highways engineers also visited as part of the Council's skill-building plan, aimed at preparing the team for future projects.

You got in contact with our onsite Community Engagement Team 275 times. Every enquiry received an answer, with an average response time of 1 day.

Residents were updated on the project through our Hamden Way Reconstruction newsletters. This is the sixth newsletter we have sent.
